Sunday the 26th of January

Monday the 27th of January

10.00am - 12.00 noon. A Post Impressionist view

After twenty five years of Impressionist paintings a new generation of artists assaulted the art market. With their revolutionary colours and departure from classical form they hollowed out an agenda proclaiming the way into the 20th Century and the advent of modern art.

Each day a buffet lunch will be served in the dining room. This lunch will be available between 12.30 and 1.30pm.

Those not on the art course are welcome to join you for lunch as well, and the cost of any lunches they take with you will just be added to their final account.

2.00pm - 4.00pm. The magic of Chagall

Marc Chagall was a Russian émigré who created his own mixture of modern art, based on his ideas of Eastern European and Jewish folklore. He spent the wartime years in his native Belarus, becoming one of the country's most distinguished artists. Following the Bolshevik Revolution, he travelled to Paris and New York and developed his idiosyncratic and imaginative style which has become his leitmotif.

Tuesday the 28th of January

10.00am - 12.00 noon. Kandinsky and the Blue Rider Group

Der Blaue Reiter took its name from a publication in 1912 by Wassily Kandinsky and Franz Marc for their two exhibitions in Munich in 1911 and 1912. The artists associated with *Der Blaue Reiter* were important pioneers of modern art of the 20th century; they formed a loose network of relationships, but not an integrated art group lasting only until the outbreak of war in 1914.

A buffet lunch will be served in the dining room between 12.30 and 1.30pm.

2.00pm - 4.00pm. The colour of Matisse

In Paris at the turn of the 20th Century a newly formed Exhibiting Salon showed works which launched Henri Matisse into the public sphere using extreme colours as a vehicle for strong expression.

Wednesday the 29th of January

10.00am - 12.00 noon. The Vienna secession

The Secessionists were formed in 1897 with Kustave Klimt as the first President in opposition to the Vienna Academy of Arts. It prime intention was to create art that unified the various disciplines of Fine Art with Decorative Art but in 1905 a dispute arose about these aspects and it split the group.

Wednesday the 29th of January (continued)

2.00pm - 4.00pm. The female surrealists

The German artist Max Ernest had a close affinity with four women and each of them in turn exerted an influence on the Surrealist movement directly as a consequence of the association, and in particular by embracing his style of painting.

6.00pm.

Bert will host an informal bucks-fizz reception in the main lounges. Everyone will have downed tools by now, and this is an excellent opportunity to unwind and enjoy the company of your compatriots.
