'How to Win a War'

Determination - Deception - Decryption

From Thursday the 20th of February until the morning of Monday the 24th of February 2025



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War is not just won through actions on the battle-field. A whole number of other factors and strategies come into play. The Film and History Break in 2025 returns to World War Two and explores three of the key means by which that war was fought and won.

First, there needed to be a resolute determination from everyone - be it a civilian or a member of the Armed Forces - to play one's part, whatever the sacrifice and cost to the individual.

Second, it was essential to be expert in the art of deception – misleading the enemy through a combination of false reports often submitted by double agents and supportive visual disinformation.

Third, no-one should underestimate the role of decryption with both sides employing vast resources and ingenious methods to decode enemy messages as quickly as possible.

As usual, a major feature film will be screened during each of the afternoon sessions of the break. The films to be shown are **36 Hours** – an exciting thriller in which the Germans go to great lengths to dupe an American Officer into revealing the location of the D-Day landings; **Enigma** – another thriller which seeks to uncover both the identity of a spy working at Bletchley Park and solve the mystery as to why key information uncovered by the British code-breakers is being concealed from their own people. The third film, **Malta Story**, illustrates the remarkable personal commitment and ingenuity required to see the conflict through, in the most hopeless of circumstances. Much of the plot of this film is based on the lives of real individuals and Ian will explain this further in his accompanying presentations.

As usual, the morning sessions will consist of a mixture of lectures and the screening of shorter documentary films all designed to complement the feature films to be shown each afternoon. So, the morning sessions will include items on life on the home front; the battle for Malta; the imaginative methods employed to deceive the enemy as to the strength of defensive and offensive positions and likely future battle-grounds; the Katyn Massacres and each side's code-breaking activities.

This will be the seventh Film and History Break which Ian will have run at Green Park. Much of the content reflects feedback from previous courses and draws on his detailed research into various war topics. Ian is confident that you will find this new programme informative and thought-provoking.



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Thursday the 20th of February

A Film and History Session with Ian. Talk and screening of the exciting war-time thriller *36 Hours*. Starring James Garner and Rod Taylor the question is whether the former will be tricked into revealing the Allies' plans for their landings in Europe.

Film and History Break with Ian Garden

Ian Garden – Background note

Born in Muir of Ord and brought up in Linlithgow and Edinburgh, Ian has been running Film and History Breaks at Green Park for a number of years.

Ian is a French and German Honours graduate from the University of St Andrews who spent much of his life working in International and Corporate Banking, firstly for the Bank of Scotland and then HBOS.



He opened the Bank's first office in Germany in 1993 and it was during his three year posting to Frankfurt that he really had an opportunity to indulge his interest in WW2 film propaganda.

On retiring from the Bank in 2008, Ian researched and wrote a book called ***The Third Reich's Celluloid War*** which was published by the History Press in 2012, and raised considerable interest from the press and the radio both in this country and abroad. In 2016, Ian launched his second book - ***Battling with the Truth***- which explores which side was more truthful in their newsreel and press coverage of key events in WW2 and it reveals a number of surprising findings.

Ian is now a recognised authority on war film propaganda and gives regular talks to universities, Rotary, Probus and other private clubs around the UK, and he has also given a number of lectures in the United States. His sessions at the Edinburgh International Book Festival in 2012 and 2016 were sold out on the first day that tickets went on sale. He also writes magazine articles and is currently working on a number of projects involving adding English sub-titles to foreign films.

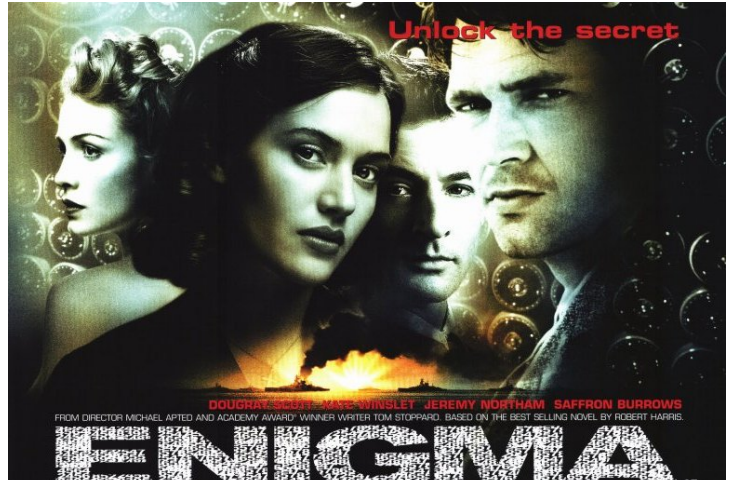
As a result of the success of his books, since 2013 Ian has been running film courses in Edinburgh over 6 weeks each spring – currently held at the Dominion Cinema.
